

## TRANSPORTATION OF LIQUIDS AND THE LIST OF PROHIBITED ITEMS IN HAND LUGGAGE

### 1. LIQUIDS

Adjusted Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2015/1998 entered into force on the 1st of September 2015. It specifies the list of prohibited items and restricts the volume of liquids, which is allowed to be carried into a cabin of aircraft inside a hand luggage. All the liquids, which passengers intends to carry into the cabin are the subject to security control. The aim is to protect all passengers in the airline transport.

Passengers are allowed to carry subjects of liquid, paste or gel nature in their hand luggage only if:

- carried in separated bags with volume max 100ml/100g
- carried in clear resealable plastic bag (along with aerosols and gels) with capacity max 1 litre, while the content of the plastic bag fits inside without any problems and the bag is completely sealed

All the liquids must be taken out of the hand luggage and declared separately at the airport detection control placed in a container.

This group consists of:

- Shampoos
- parfumes
- non-alcoholic and alcoholic beverages
- other liquid substances
- toothpaste
- hair gels
- other liquid, paste or gel substances, or substances with similar consistency
- non flammable hair sprays
- non flammable deo sprays
- groceries and beverages of liquid, paste or gel nature

Liquids necessary for diabetic patients, liquid drugs, contact lens solutions etc., are allowed to be carried inside the hand luggage even in larger quantities than 100ml, it is not requested to submit a medical certificate. Also fluids for babies are allowed to be carried in volume reasonable to length of flight and greater than 100ml.

It does not matter for carried liquids what the actual content of package is but that, which is stated on the packing.

### 2. PROHIBITED ARTICLES IN HAND BAGGAGE

*Without prejudice to applicable safety rules, passengers are not permitted to carry the following articles into security restricted areas and on board an aircraft:*

**A. guns, firearms and other devices that discharge projectiles – devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury by discharging a projectile, including:**

- firearms of all types, such as pistols, revolvers, rifles, shotguns
- toy guns, replicas and imitation firearms capable of being mistaken for real weapons
- component parts of firearms, excluding telescopic sights
- compressed air and CO2 guns, such as pistols, pellet guns, rifles and ball bearing guns
- signal flare pistols and starter pistols

- bows, cross bows and arrows
- harpoon guns and spear guns
- slingshots and catapults

***B. stunning devices – devices designed specifically to stun or immobilise, including:***

- devices for shocking, such as stun guns, tasers and stun batons
- animal stunners and animal killers
- disabling and incapacitating chemicals, gases and sprays, such as mace, pepper sprays, capsicum sprays, tear gas, acid sprays and animal repellent sprays

***C. objects with a sharp point or sharp edge – objects with a sharp point or sharp edge capable of being used to cause serious injury, including:***

- items designed for chopping, such as axes, hatchets and cleavers
- ice axes and ice picks
- razor blades
- box cutters
- knives with blades of more than 6 cm
- scissors with blades of more than 6 cm as measured from the fulcrum
- martial arts equipment with a sharp point or sharp edge
- swords and sabres

***D. workmen's tools – tools capable of being used either to cause serious injury or to threaten the safety of aircraft, including:***

- crowbars
- drills and drill bits, including cordless portable power drills
- tools with a blade or a shaft of more than 6 cm capable of use as a weapon, such as screwdrivers and chisels
- saws, including cordless portable power saws
- blowtorches
- bolt guns and nail guns

***E. blunt instruments – objects capable of being used to cause serious injury when used to hit, including:***

- baseball and softball bats
- clubs and batons, such as billy clubs, blackjacks and night sticks
- martial arts equipment

***F. explosives and incendiary substances and devices – explosives and incendiary substances and devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury or to pose a threat to the safety of aircraft, including:***

- ammunition
- blasting caps
- detonators and fuses
- replica or imitation explosive devices
- mines, grenades and other explosive military stores
- fireworks and other pyrotechnics
- smoke-generating canisters and smoke-generating cartridges
- dynamite, gunpowder and plastic explosives
